	5.1 Supporting Phonemic Awareness in the Early Years Hi

Freeburn started by explaining that we are deepening our understanding of how to teach kids to read. While we are learning remotely we are committed to teaching reading especially in the early years (Gr. 1-3). She explained why phonemic awareness is important and how face shields and masks are affecting students' ability to fully understand language development (face shields and masks inhibit this), and that we need to find a way to teach phonemic awareness with these restrictions in place. Phonemic awareness comes before phonics and the goal is to bring accessible learning to those who require structured literacy approach to the classroom. Heggerty phonemic awareness was chosen to bring a targeted approach with videos of 8-12 minutes per day, that are being embedded into the teachers' routine. The tool is also accessible to families. An example video was shown of a Heggerty lesson. These tools are in our schools, and the rollout has gone well with parents using them at home; there hasn't been a disruption within the classroom learning. We will be looking at phonics books to line up with Heggerty, jolly phonics and writing and review the impact down the road and we are excited about where this is going. C. Davies noted that she is pleased with how this is being rolled out, a great initiative on how these children are beginning to learn. M. McIntyre asked about statistics to help show the benefits of the program. H. Freeburn talked of diagnostics (5-10 min) in Sept, mid-year, then June and that we currently see growth and areas of need. EDI's (Early Developmental Instrument) will help track these diagnostics and how the program impacts the students. She also mentioned that a student could pick up 'lost' learning because the sessions are not geared or identified by grades and can be used in any stage, even high school since it 					
	N. Morden Cormier added that we will see a renewed focus on reading and writing with all students, with the desire for the narrative, the numbers, and our readers to be confident.

M fundi the e work peop we st writin gove this is	Marton provided the committee with a reflective budget overview, with a focus on the sources of becial education funding, noting that there are lot of funding rules. The slides provide an overview of e specific portions to be received for special education next year and he noted that overall, we are nticipating an increase in funding and should be able to deliver a high level of learning to students as previous years. Mannisto asked about an overspending amount, and without the info at hand A. Marton could onfirm the amount later. Morden Cormier asked W. Goodman to provide an overview of how we have managed to increase nding received for special education. He explained that claims for funding are being completed, giving e example that some situations the requirements for spec ed works out to minutes over the regular ork hours to provide health, safety and medical needs to a student (e.g. lunch, recess, with multiple eople required to provide support over an entire day). Applications are time consuming to prepare but a started receiving funds a few years ago. The MDT (multi-disciplinary team) has become experts at riting the claims and this ensures funds from other systems are unaffected. He added that the overnment is looking at changing the application process (should become more efficient), ending that is is a perfect example of where a little funding has allowed us to go a lot further.					
	5.3	MILO Update	Melissa Bianco				

	 L. Koski (spec ed teacher) and B. Vachon (principal) shared their experience implementing MILO at their school (soft-launch of a three-year implementation) and the successes and challenges. L. Koski's presentation provided an overview of how the student became excellent fit and independent with MILO (engaged and required very little prompting). Initially, the EA joined in the session and learning took place. Behavioural/calm-down strategies were utilized in the classroom (student was previously not in a classroom). The EA supported the curriculum and MILO delivered it. The student's social skills have changed (verbal greetings, practiced/learned with MILO). There is an avatar available, improved reporting and provided parent newsletters, along with plenty of other modules and updates for next year. Some data is available from the year. S. Wallwin (guest) asked how other students interacted with MILO, and would it be a goal to bring MILO into a classroom? L. Koski explained there was a small group working with them, with students interested in MILO but MILO was not brought in. M. Bianco noted that it would be interesting to bring MILO in and see the social/emotional learning that could take place with other students. M. McIntyre was impressed to see the progress/promise and hopes for expansion, requesting the same update to be presented to the board of directors. Virtual SEAC Meetings
