Schram presented an informative Power Point on the *Myths and Facts*, by Dr. Christine Suurtmon, Associate Professor at University of Ottawa, surrounding math being taught in schools and opinions of learning mathematics, i.e. Myth: only some people are capable of doing math. Fact; All students are capable of doing math.

6.5 Results of: Tell Them From Me

(Nancy Petrick)

N. Petrick presented following information as a result of data collected to the PIC group: Between the end of January and March all of our high school students completed a student outcomes and school climate survey:

Results of this survey were broken down into the following reports for the schools:

- a. School Climate
- b. School Completion
- c. Career Pathways

Tonight I would like to highlight some of the results that came from the school completion and Career pathway portion of the survey.

What we know and what the research is saying:

1. 3 of every 4 students (Canada) will graduate from secondary school within the allotted time period (4 or 5 years)

- 2. School completion is a significant predictor of a students' long term health, economic success and general well being
- All children have a certain probability of completing school but there are many factors that impact this (family background, academic achievement, engagement, mental health, and learning climate)
- Successful development of literacy skills leads to greater participation and strong sense of belonging
- 5. Longitudinal studies have indicated there are a number of protective factors related to school completion (grouped into seven categories)
 - a. Demographics
 - b. Academic
 - c. Social engagement
 - d. Institutional engagement
 - e. Intellectual engagement
 - f. Positive mental health
 - g. Learning climate
- 6. This survey measures each of these protective factors which are considered personal assets that increase a students' likelihood of completing school.
- 7. Our average probability of school completion is 74% where the Canadian average is 78%
- 8. A statistical technique called cluster analysis is used to identify types of students that have similar profiles in terms of their assets for school completion, they are:
 - a. Engaged
 - b. Disengaged
 - c. Disconnected
 - d. Struggling
 - e. Alienated
- 9. In all five of our high schools the highest percentage of students seems to be Disengaged and Disconnected and struggling are next.

Suggestions:

- 1. Work on building literacy skills
- 2. Building relationships, student: student
- 3. Maintain high expectations for success
- 4. Monitor student successes regularly
- 5. Continue to build on connecting students and families to the school
